Kingston Pen Tours

Go behind the walls of Canada's oldest prison, now decommissioned. This National Historic Site offers daily guided tours from May through October, ideal for groups interested in Canadian history and architecture.

The Haunted Walk

Join a storyteller for a guided evening tour exploring Kingston's haunted streets, historic sites, and thrilling tales by lanternlight. Perfect for groups seeking a memorable, immersive experience.

Fort Henry

Step back in time at this UNESCO World Heritage Site and experience 19th-century military life. Guided tours, rifle demonstrations, Victorian schoolrooms, and sunset military ceremonies are available for groups of any size.

S.S. Keewatin

Step aboard the fully restored 1907 Great Lakes steamship. Explore its original fixtures, artifacts, and working technology on daily guided tours from May through November. The Great Lakes Museum, home of the S.S. Keewatin, is open year-round.
