

On the shore of Lake Ontario, both spaces can be explored during regular business hours and provide photo ops for limestone or glass-framed selfies.

SPRINGER MARKET SQUARE/216 Ontario St. Home to city hall and the city's largest farmers market, Springer Market Square is the spot for both historic and candid shots.

WOLFE ISLAND FERRY/



CONFEDERATION BASIN/6 Clarence St. The historical heart of downtown has to be Confederation Basin. At the centre of the park is an arced water fountain along with spectacular shore views, a bustling marina and city hall in the background. It's no wonder visitors flock to this spot to snap that "Wish you were here" pic for the folks back home.

FORT HENRY/1 Fort Henry Dr. Fort Henry is a city treasure, and the vistas don't get better than this. Climb onto the east side of the hill for a view overlooking the entire city, including the Royal Military College and vast waters of Lake Ontario. 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Maple Madness

THE SWEET TRADITION CONTINUES

Maple Madness returns this spring with a host of interactive and educational activities for maple fans of all ages. Located in Little Cataraqui Creek Conservation Area, just north of Kingston, the annual celebration is an opportunity for folks from across the region to catch a glimpse of one of the most storied of Canadian spring traditions – maple tree tapping – in a manner that's hands-on, fun and, if you include the pancakes, quite tasty!

Why not get outside, spend some time in nature, and learn about the history, heritage, and significance of maple sugar and maple syrup in Canada's culture, economy and national story?

Running throughout March Break (March 10-18) and continuing the

following two weekends (March 24-25 and March 31-April 1), Maple Madness lets visitors experience the entire process of producing this sweet spring delicacy, featuring a variety of unique and informative demonstrations using both oldfashioned and modern methods.

Start your day with a puppet show at the outdoor centre, then climb aboard a tractor-drawn wagon ride into the sugar bush to see how trees are tapped. Learn how the sap is boiled down to the perfect consistency to make the liquid gold known as maple syrup, and sample just how tasty warm maple syrup can be. For a real treat, try it on some freshly made pancakes in the rustic sugar shack.



Each Saturday, you can also experience an interactive First Nations maple syrup display, led by Paul Carl, and on Saturday, March 24, try your hand at some 'old-tyme' sugar bush chores, such as sawing logs, emptying sap buckets and tapping trees.

The Cataraqui Conservation Foundation hosts a fundraising bake sale on Saturday, March 18, while the always-popular maple taffy demonstration happens Saturday, March 31.







We're So Crafty

WOLFE ISLAND SPRING CRAFT BEER

Kingston's newest neighbour and the latest addition to the city's burgeoning craft beer scene, the Wolfe Island Spring Craft Brewery serves up tasty suds of all sorts to thirsty patrons around town. With a wide selection of lagers, ales and everything in between, the Wolfe Island Spring Craft Brewery boasts a robust lineup of full-bodied brews for every palate. Try their signature brew Wolfenstein Cannonball Ale - a German Steinbier brewed with an authentic, 36lb solid iron cannonball, literally dredged from the bottom of Lake Ontario and likely leftover from one of many conflicts surrounding the Great Lakes during the War of 1812. The cannonball is heated significantly hotter than the German's brewers. This heat caramelizes sugars from the malt to help balance bitterness from the hops, and the residual iron the cannonball leaves in the beer gives it its crisp and refreshing finish.


"I've got lots of pictures that would take me back under the age of five," says James Malcolm – "enjoying a camping trip, fishing." Why did you choose to come to Kingston?

We're very much water-focused, my wife and I. Kingston provided not only Lake Ontario but so much paddling to be done north of the city. It's an outdoor community. I think we're a community-focused city – I love the caring nature of the people that live here.

What neighbourhood do you live in?

We live in Milton in the East End. We've been lucky enough to move onto the water. It's kind of

What are your favourite outdoor spring activities?

I love hiking Frontenac (Provincial) Park – it provides such great topography! When you get into the northern part of the park, it's such great hills. Spring provides less growth on the trees, which means the visibility is greater, your line of sight – you can look for several hundred metres in any direction. I love that new growth, with the green against the grey.

What's Kingston's best-kept secret?
